Public comment

The City needs more accessible Public restroom

City Council and State Representative's updates

6-4-Brian Cina-Governor vetoed 3 bills; marijuana, entire budget of state and education bill. There was a lot negotiation between Governor and Legislature to come to a negotiation on education. Under the change of Affordable Care Act it took away collective bargaining from local decision to State to save 26million. This will be going back to veto session. Governor said will not veto other bills.

6-3 Curt McCormack-Passed bill on Farm to School. Being expanded to day care to be a nutrition program and sourced from local farms. Passed bill on TIF but not an expansion in Burlington. New Tax Increment Financing going to be focused on places of economic hard times. Put 45 million in clean water. 3 major budget, general, capital budget of transportation and capital reconstruction which is for capital buildings and parks. If feds drop any efficiency standards, then state picks up the program. Created Green Mountain retirement plan that's voluntary. Gender neutral bathrooms passed in house but died in Senate. Did a racial justice bill. Family bill hasn't been passed yet. H. 422, a bill that would allow for the temporary confiscation of a firearm when domestic abuse occurs did pass the House on a close vote but the bill died in the Senate Judiciary Committee

Ward 2 City Council, Max Tracey -Passed all landlords that phase in over 20months covered recycling bins so all rental properties are covered. After then will require home owners to do this. This is to prevent on a windy day that recyclables don't go into streets and become trash which can't be recycled. Up the requirement to 21 gallons per unit. Passed permit reform and will move forward in the next couple of months. Received several bids for Burlington Telecom due to bankruptcy. The City will likely remain a minority stake holder. Before put out to bid there was a set of community benefit criteria. Will pick three bids that match these criteria and will look to settle in Jan. City increase 2 additional officers and increase of foot patrol which is reflected in the FY18. If street lights are out then contact BED. Use see Click FiX. June 24th will

have dumpster for neighborhood cleanup at Ward 3 voting at SA 10-3p. Can help with transportation too.

Opioid Policy Update

Jackie Corbally, City's Opioid Policy Coordinator-Never been faced with epidemic like this with fatal overdoses. Community flooded with NarCan. 2016, there were 36 overdoses. Right now the 36 surpasses last year's number. Not just dealing with heroin and dealing with Carfentanil. Have not seen Cartfentanil but have suspicion. Safety officers are not trained in mental health and deal with every day in a caring way. Connected CCOA and work with Chief Police and Mayor closely to address this epidemic. Opioidpolicybtv twitter feed show overdoses surpassed guns and traffic death combined. Partner with Milton, Colchester, Winooski and soon Richmond to meet on a regular. Holding non-profits and treatment accountable to give people immediate treatment. Prevent is number 1 strategy in a systems change to further stop people to being addicts. Engaging with hospital to look at alternative chronic pain treatment and also those who are given prescriptions monitoring closer. Over 60% that get addicted get hooked due to prescribed pain medicines. Also law enforcement has worked with DEA and arresting a lot of dealers that is a pipe line from NY. The outreach team of Howard is critical to addiction and mental health. DCF has a spike in children 0-5years going into the system. Many of these children are children of addicts. Housing is a concern on how to help reunify these families again.

St. Joseph's School Move Recap + Tour

Candice Holbrook, Parks and Recreation-Move in date for Senior Center is Nov. 17 from Champlain Multi-generation to St. Joseph's on 20 Allen Street. 1st floor will be managed by Old North End studies. There is a kitchen which will be updated to have efficiencies. There will be wheelchair assessable ramp that will go into cafeteria where the NPA meetings will be. This will be a great space and will have 4 or 5 staff from Parks.
