Public announcement

Karen Long- Went to a meeting on Tuesday 10th about Bank and Cherry Street Conceptual Design Plans. Encourage people to comment on new streets through CEDO public feedback link. The deadline to comment is April 30th.

Lynn Martin-Also went to the Bank and Cherry Design. Don't like the design and there are no retail in the plans.

Tony Redington-Pine street coalition laid down a challenge to start a new planning process for a cleaner and safer Champlain Parkway. This challenge was issued to the State, federal Government, and City. They have 90 days to respond. If don't respond by then will start a court action. There is a proposal to create a resolution to improve intersection safety at Cambrian Rise development from signal and round about design.

James Lockridge-Encourage people to add comments about Bank and Cherry on CEDO's website. Now is the time to express to the City what we want to see to benefit our future. Went to a business meeting and learned CEDO is managing 100k to create ways to minimize disruption and if the City. If the City can has money to do this, then the public should think about how to use the money to apply usefully on the people's behalf. Need to have a conversation with the business community that brings compassion and understanding to homeless population.

Janet Carscadden- Small business owners less than 50 employees or self-employed can't put retirement money away per year that's more than \$5500.00. The State for years has been talking about doing a public retirement plan. Now the State is developing a multi-business retirement on Jan. 1st 2019. This is a game changer for small business owner.

Jimmy Weez-Got 55% on town meeting against basing the F35. Got support from the City Council but the Mayor won't support the federal letter. The F35 is so loud and has a dangerous sound decimal.

Dept. of Public Works Construction Update

Rob Goulding, Public Information Manager- This is the 2nd year of the sustainable infrastructure plan. 2016 voters approved 2 bonds to do preventative maintenance and get to a regular repair cycle. Last year which was the 1st. Did 2 miles of relining, replace 3 miles of sidewalks and paved 5 miles. This year will do 3miles of relining. The construction portal shows the work 2 or 3 years out.

There are 7 miles of road that don't have sidewalks. Do hope to expand sidewalks but ranking the use to prioritize the limited funds. If having an issue on an intersection can call customer service Phone 863-9094 to make an assessment. Manhattan will be paved in early May. St. Paul to Maple will be transformed and will start in June. Pine St. north of Maple up until Main from April-June will have local traffic. Approved temporary parking will be added.

Chapin Spenser, Director- 3 years ago did a study with a device that ranked the efficiencies and deterioration of all the sidewalks. This help prioritized the work schedule. Last year was the first year of voter approved sidewalk and wasn't able to get down all that was on the list. This year if what was not done should get down this year. Call Chapin or Rob if there are holes that need to be worked on and will look at it to put it on the list. Phone calls work great to customer service which will enter into see fix clix that will time stamp and record. UVM and Champlain put money to bond over 6 million. It was a negotiation that UVM wanted University Place to be taken cared for 20 years and with this deal a portion of the money will go back into the City Streets. There are number of communities don't have storm water utility. Set up a storm water utility in 2009. 99% of the time storm water will go into the waste treatment before it goes into the lake. There are no lead pipes in the City's pipe system but there may be lead pipe in people's personal piping. Highly regulated by the feds and have not detected lead.

Steering Committee election:

3 candidates. Perry Freeman, Ward 3, Lizzy Haskell Ward 3 and James Lockridge-Ward 3. All were nominated as Steering Committee members.

City Council Updates

Brian Pine-F35 resolution will stand without the Mayor's action. This Monday was on the park about a resolution that takes a time out to engage in a process. There is an alternative resolution that strikes City Council resolution. On chair of CDNR and also on Public Safety and HR.

Max Tracey-chair Transportation and Energy. Glad to be still on the committee and done a lot of work to improve safety in the city. The Winooski Corridor is an important project to be engaged in. It's a main corridor. The McNeil plant loses a lot of heat. A lot of cities captures this heat to use. This is a financial and environmental benefit. Participatory budgeting which sets a side of money and then gets put on the ballot for neighborhoods to vote on how use the funds. On license committee. Want to focus on safety in bars and be pro-active to minimizing sexual assault. Train bar and restaurant employees to recognize signs to prevent.

Jane Knodell-On Ordinance and Finance. One issue is ELR which is 500k of property tax per year that was going to school but now goes to the City due to State law. This is an underfunded area but programs such as family room and Sarah Holbrook can be eligible. Need to go back to the drawing board to make sure this ELR is going to help the local needs of early childcare. What's important is to make sure that there's genuine democratic process and not do deals behind closed doors. The council requested a presentation on Monday night about new BTC design and also understand why the administration could change the design under the form base code.

Representative updates

Jill Krowinski - Chittenden 6-3- Worked on gun violence prevention. Yesterday had gun signing to pass 6-gun safety measures that domestic violence, raised age to 21 but can take safety program if 18 to get access. Banned bum stock and high capacity weapon. Put 6 million for school safety assessment. Put money into mental health. 2nd issue, had a proposal to address clean water. If there is no solution on funding by 2020 then a 2 dollar hotel tax will kick in.

Brian Cina- Chittenden 6-4. On House Healthcare committee. Our healthcare system is under State and Federal attack. Governor is not supporting drugs that are important for people to take. The committee is

patching the holes and fighting for cost subsidies. There are too many people falling through the cracks and identifying where the gaps are: which are 24hr peer support help line, housing, and facilities. Mental health isn't fully funded but has been integrated into healthcare system. Universal health care would control the cost. Personal project is looking at Artificial Intelligence and the impacts. This proposal has passed in House and now in the Senate Operations Committee. It will create a task force from different fields to look at impacts and recommend regulation or having a standing committee.

Curt McCormack 6-3- Net neutrality is a concept that makes sure the internet providers do not show favoritism to customers that pay more or agree with them, looked to federal government for a federal law to for net neutrality but they came short. Now working on a waiver to prevent this in our State. 2nd issue is to come up with a resolution that commends attorney general and natural resource department to follow CA standards.

Selena Colburn-6-4-Member of the House Judiciary which worked on gun issues. There are a number of bills that focus on environmental and consumers. S197 is a bill around toxic substances. This bill says that the person who did the exposure can be liable. Another part is if exposure is resulting disease then the person can be responsible to your medical bill. Providing medical assistance treatment to prison. This will reduce overdose rate down.

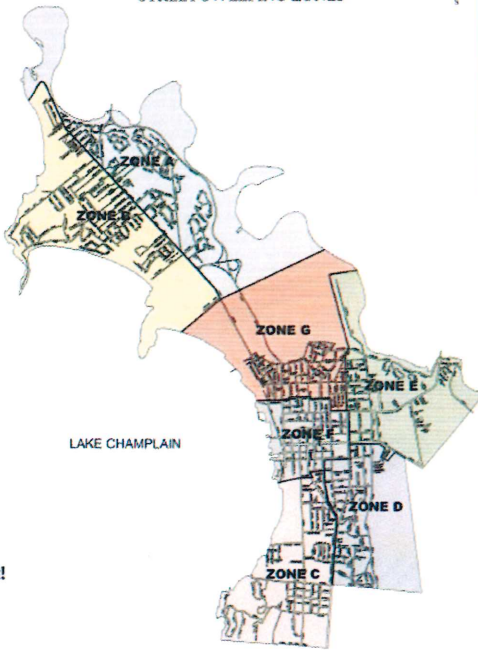
